begiven to my prefent undertaking.

It is monflible to recount all the advantages that the public will recieve from the publication of a GAZETTE in this Diffrict. First, t will give a quick and ge era'i formation concerning the intentions and behaviour of our neighbouring enemies and put us upon our guard against their future violence. Eastern Coal Field: Pre-1930






Eastern Coal Field: Post-1930
