Dear Dean Roper:

I hope the school year is progressing well for you and your students and that you found the information on law librarianship and the Southeastern Chapter useful and interesting. Planning continues for the 1990 meeting. The main meeting will be held from April 5 through April 7, 1990 with a special additional institute on management scheduled for April 7 and 8. As details of the program are available I will forward them to you.

The chapter would also like to assist you in your introduction of the students to different forms of librarianship. If you hold a "career day" or have a class in Special Librarianship which includes guest speakers from the various library specialties, we can arrange for one of our members to participate. We believe law librarianship is among those library specialties to be on the cutting edge of information management. Law librarians were among the first to perform full-text database searching in the early 1970's.
