PERSONAL.

Dean Whitlock of the University of Montana law school and a graduate of this University paid the Law Department a short visit during the holidays.

Mr. C. W. Williams '13 now located at West Point, Ky., was a visitor during the holidays.

Dean Lafferty represented State University at the annual meeting of the Association of American Law Schools in Chicago January 28-30. On his return he announced that the standard of the law school will be raised next year. All students under the age of 21 matriculating after September 1, 1915, will be required to do one year college work before graduating from the College of Law.

Arrangements are about to be completed whereby Judge George Durell, of Louisville, graduate of Yale, will deliver a course of lectures on Federal Court Practice to the law students. Judge Durell was a judge on the Appellate bench for eight years and for the last four years has been Federal District Attorney.

Judge Lafferty announces that the law library will be increased with an addition of 600 volumes within a short time.

The annual debate between the Union and Patterson literary societies was won by the Union on which were two law students Mr. S. S. Combs and Mr. J. N. Farmer.

Douglas D. Felix, a former student of this institution and now taking law at Yale was a visitor recently. He announces that he contemplates settling in Kentucky.

The College of Law has completed negotiations with the Law School of Cincinnati University for an intercollegiate debate. The question submitted for debate is, Resolved: "That the safety of the United States requires that she maintain a navy equal to any of the great navies of the world."

The terms are that each school will have two teams, one to argue the affirmative and one the negative side of the question, one team going to Cincinnati and debating one side of the question there and the other

remaining in Lexington and meeting an opposing team from Cincinnati. The time for having the debate is March 5th.

In the preliminary try-out the following six men were chosen to represent the University: B. D. Sartin, F. A. Harrison, J. D. Chamberlain, Thomas Creekmore, G. C. Bradley and J. C. Torrence.
